This term our Trust aim has been to ensure that our SEN curriculum continues to develop further, meeting the needs and interests of our pupils. We know that engaged and interested learners make greater progress and we are working tirelessly across the SEND setting to ensure that our high expectations are met and exceeded. The introduction of Forest School at Hamilton School this term has seen really positive engagement from our learners and helping them build their social skills.

Hamilton School is part of the Special and Alternative Provision Hub within the Maiden Erlegh Trust and this year we have welcomed Oak Tree School into the SEN hub this term and it has been great to see the progress staff and pupils have made in giving the school its culture and identity.

It has been an exciting term for Hamilton School with improved levels of parent and pupil engagement, and we are excited for the new year.

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Curriculum Updates

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Art Mr Woolford

During this term we have been working on lots of different things in Art. We have looked at colour theory; primary colours and secondary colours, cold and warm colours as well as complementary and harmonizing colours.

We have also looked at practicing our drawing skills using tone and shade to help create 3D forms.

Currently in years 7-9 and year 11 we are researching the creation and use of masks from different cultures. This has led to the pupils designing and creating their own masks from cardboard and paper mache. Year 10 have been looking at an artist called Alex Williamson and are creating a Sports related artwork.









Next term year 7 will be looking at mark making and the work of Van Gogh. Year 8 and 9 will be looking at the work of Michael Keck and creating their own animal/pet collage. Year 10 and 11 will be creating their own portrait inspired by Julian Opie, Vik Muniz and Eduardo Morales.

English

Happy Festive season from Team English!

For Key Stage three students, we have been enjoying the gritty



novel, 'Brock' and cementing the reciprocal reading skills of predicting, questioning, clarifying and summarising.

Year 10 students have completed the first component in their Step Up to English qualification and Year 11 have been practising summarising, comparing and analysing viewpoints in texts. These are some of the key skills required for their Language GCSE next year.

Physical Education Mrs Burford



This half term has been as busy as ever! All groups have been working well in their PE lessons learning new skills.

Some groups have been to the tennis courts for tennis lessons and worked super well whilst out there. We are looking forward to using the tennis courts more often when the weather is dry!

Pine class devised a new version of dodgeball which has been rolled out across some classes and has been played really well. Instead of being 'out' if you are hit by a ball, the opposition get a point. However, if your throw is caught, your team loses a point!

Year 11 looked at the Paralympics and tried their hands at playing 'sitting volleyball' and also goalball, which they found challenging but enjoyable.

Food Technology Mr Bartenbach

We have had a fantastically festive half term in Food Tech. We have been making Christmas cakes, honing our skills in selecting the correct ingredients and weighing them out; mixing and incorporating ingredients, and most importantly, rolling out icing and decorating our cakes.

Apart from making other festive treats, such as mince pies, we have partnered with Forest School and have been cooking out on open fires. The bacon sandwiches have been particularly delicious!

We are looking forward to creating more culinary delights next term.

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Forest School

Mr Russell

This half term we have been experimenting with fire making across the curriculum, covering aspects of Food Technology, Science, Design & Technology and Personal Development.

To name but a few activities:

-Sharpened our culinary skills, cooking a variety of food and and popping popcorn in sieves over the open flames

-Learnt how to use a flint and steel and a ferro rod to ignite a fire

-Explored different fire builds and how to keep a fire going

-Taken part in rope burn competitions

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-Explored how to build fires underground: perfect for autumnal windy days! -Learnt how to make charcoal on a small fire, donating what we've produced to the Art Department

- -Made charcloth out of socks, using them as fire lighters.
- -Used saws to cut down wooden pallets for firewood

-Continued with whittling skills

All of this has supported the development of problem solving, communication, perseverance and resilience as they manage times such as when their fires go out or they find it difficult to get them started, with parallels drawn between these experiences and the difficulties they may face with their academic work.

When we return in January we will be doing more advanced fire cooking, exploring more survival skills and learning to master a wider range of relevant tools.

Maths Mr Ramsamy

KS3 started the term learning about the Cartesian Plane. They plotted and drew different variations of the straight line graph. Next up was data. They learnt about the different types of data and how to compile, read, and interpret tables of data. They will learn about probability in the last week of term. Next term they will learn some algebra which will include equations and inequalities

Year 10 started the term by learning how to solve equations. They then moved onto learning about inequalities and how to solve linear inequalities. Next up was learning how to solve two equations simultaneously. Next term they will learn some geometry which will include vectors and bearings.

The year 11 started off with expanding and factorising (Algebra). They then moved onto solving equations and inequalities. They have also started working GCSE exam papers so that they get a feel of exactly what is required of them in the actual exams. Next term they will continue with more algebra and then onto geometric reasoning.



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Work Experience Mr Versace

Careers at Hamilton has taken a positive step forward this term with the first work experience placement since the Covid pandemic.

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Thanks to our colleagues at Education Business Partnership (EBP), our students are completing a weeklong placement at a range of centres, in fields ranging from customer service and retail to logistics and storage.

One of our students, who was unable to secure an external placement this time around, has taken on the role of a teaching assistant for the week and has stepped up to the role brilliantly. One other student is completing his week-long experience working on the family business, with extended working hours than he would complete at school.

A big thank you to all those placements who have taken on our students for this week and given them an invaluable opportunity to experience the world of work. We look forward to working with you all again in the future.

We continue to focus on attendance and absence.

Overall attendance this term has been 67.38%. During this time, a total of 338 days of learning have been lost to unauthorised absence: absence that has not been agreed by the school and is not related to illness or alternative educational activities. In addition to this, we have seen 31 instances of late arrivals by students, impacting on learning time*.


Winter Clothing
